AUTUMN DELIGHTS, THE SEASON OF CREATION AND NEW STARTS

This August, the Pumpkin Spice Latte returned to the menu at Starbucks two days earlier than ever before. For some folks, it may be nigh unto sacrilege to bring out the “flavor-that-signals-autumn” while the days are still long and sunny and temperatures still hitting the 90-degree mark. The most vivid indicators of autumn for me are the sunset creeping earlier each day and the bounty of produce in our local farm stands. I wait for the availability of the Italian plums needed for Marian Burros’ Plum Torte recipe. The recipe was famously published in the NYTimes every September for years as a clear harbinger of the end of summer. The recipe not-too-subtly reminds me to appreciate the delicious fruits of the earth before the cold weather sets in.

“Season of Creation” worship resources in Episcopal and other churches are meant to strengthen our appreciation of the harvest’s bounty and the importance of caring for creation. For the month of September, this special emphasis focuses our eyes of faith on the strong and fragile beauty and complexity of all creation. It highlights our God-given obligation of responsible stewardship of the earth and creation care. Multiple diocesan bishops in the Episcopal Church, (including ours), have encouraged the observance of the “Season of Creation” so we will be doing so at Christ Church. It makes an especially apt observance as we approach October 6th, when we celebrate St. Francis of Assisi, a true lover of all God’s creation, by including the Pet Blessing at the 10:00 am worship service.

September also brings the new “program year” at church, just as the new school year begins for students and teachers. We return to our schedule of two services of Holy Eucharist on Sundays and resume Christian formation activities for children and adults. It’s a new start in the parish, one that coincides with the search committee’s work interviewing candidates for the next rector of Christ Church Pittsford. I know that God is guiding us as the program year begins, and I pray that we each will enter this new season feeling the Holy Spirit’s wind in our sails, fostering our joyful engagement in our shared parish life.

I hope that your summer months were blessed and happy and that autumn will bring more blessings and happiness perhaps with a Pumpkin Spice Latte on the side. Grace and peace in Christ to you and your dear ones!

We are so excited to welcome back our children and youth this September for another fun year of Sunday School and Youth Group. Second through fifth graders will explore with Moses and God’s people as they travel through the desert for 40 years! Our Middle and High School youth will continue to discuss Biblical topics and other issues that affect their daily lives.

Missionpalooza Recap

Eighteen of our **Youth Group** members participated in Missionpalooza from August 5 through 8. The group kicked off the week making lunch from scratch for clients and drivers of Elderberry Express, and visiting with them while all enjoyed a meal together. On the second day, part of the group cleaned an apartment owned by Family Promise to be rented by a family trying to get back on their feet, while the other part of the group spent the day involved in various tasks at Cameron Community. All had the opportunity to learn about Family Promise's mission and the epidemic of homelessness in the Rochester area.

On day 3, everyone gathered at the Episcopal Church Home for several rounds of balloon tennis and play with the giant rainbow parachute. The residents were treated to a violin solo by seventh grader Maanav Mukherjee, friend of the Dunham family and wonderful addition to our group, and a cello solo by our own Helena Dixon. Many residents were visibly moved by the music. The youth prepared sandwiches and sides to order for the residents, ate and conversed with them, and led them in a sing-a-long at the end.

The last day of volunteering took place at Cameron Community, where our youth led the children and youth day-campers in making "ice cream in a bag". We all learned their favorite dance at the end! Many thanks to Pat Morrow for planning that lesson and leading the initial instruction before our delicious ice cream "experiment".

Our trip to Seabreeze on the Friday of Missionpalooza week was foiled by heavy rain, but we brainstormed many ideas for activities and service opportunities over the coming school year. Many, many thanks to Pat and to Rev. Julianne, Kim Schaff, Nicole DeBraal, Maggie Mukherjee, Liz Barood-Solomon, Samantha Murray, and Suzanne Lee for helping during the last week and/or with the planning process. The youth received wonderful compliments at each site, and we look forward to continuing their learning and service to others.

MUSIC

Dear People of Christ Church Pittsford,

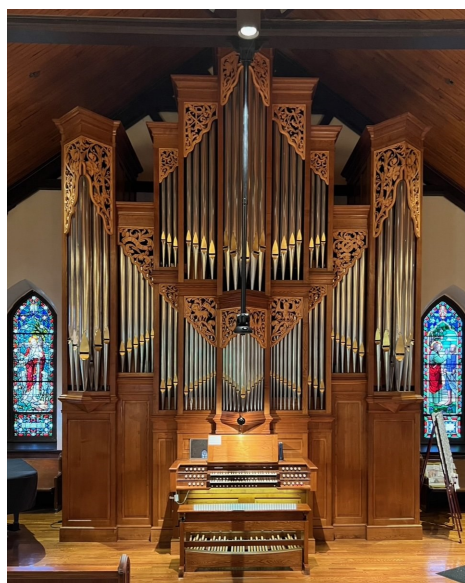
It is a great honor to write to you for the first time now as appointed Director of Music, having been interim for the past year. I hold great anticipation and excitement for the coming program year in this parish, particularly in regards to music and its ministry as part of worship. The past year was an invaluable year of learning, reflecting, and listening. Now, as we approach the start of the year, I write to you with a few thoughts, goals, and reflections regarding music in worship at Christ Church over the coming program year.

Throughout the pandemic and up to the present, we have been very fortunate to have the digital organ which is in the chancel. This instrument has served us well, allowing for high-quality recordings used in online services during the pandemic and allowing the experience of having the choir and organ lead worship from the front of the church, which has been a perennial topic of discussion for some time. Ultimately, it was put in place as a temporary measure while discussions were being had about the future of the Mander organ.

Now in 2024, I feel that it is time to re-assess this situation. This summer, the Mander accompanied services once monthly as part of an effort to better assess its current condition and its ability to serve as the church's primary instrument for worship. It is my goal that the Mander be able to serve in this capacity, so you should not be at all surprised to see the return of the choir to the back of the sanctuary.

This instrument is still in dire need of repairs and extensive renovation given its current state, however, especially if it will remain for years to come, so efforts will be made to ensure that it is brought to health soon. This likely means a revitalization of the Organ Committee, talks and consultations with organ builders and other experts in the field who can help advise on the proper course to take to ensure that it is fit to serve this church for many years to come.

I also hope to foster a culture of openness with the congregation about the state of the organ and progress being made towards improving it, so I am planning a congregational Q&A session about the organ on **Sunday, October 13th** following the 10:00 service. This will take place in the sanctuary, and will include a talk and demonstration about the current state of the organ, as well as an opportunity for questions.

Musically, it has been a goal to further strengthen the already strong tradition of congregational singing in this parish through hymns and service music which allow the participation of all, regardless of ability, while still challenging us to try new things, and to give our very best to God in one congregational voice. This year, more opportunities to make music will be offered during worship, including congregational singing of the psalms each Sunday, a very ancient practice dating perhaps back to the Old Testament, and one which continues to be practiced in a great many Episcopal and Anglican churches today. Brief sessions will be offered at **9:45am on Sundays September 15th and 22nd**, during which the choir will help to 'teach' the congregation to sing psalms. Music will also be offered at the 8:00 service twice monthly by a soloist.

This coming year, it is a goal to continue to diversify the music which is offered, and efforts are being made to widen the choir's repertoire to include more music from the 20th/21st centuries, as well as music from other traditions to supplement the core repertoire of the choral canon. In the interest of openness and congregational awareness, you will find occasional writings in the bulletin further explaining the day's musical offerings, and a printed publication of the complete music list for the season will always be available on the table in the narthex. Several extra worship opportunities involving music will be offered this fall, including a service of **Choral Evensong on Saturday, October 26th at 4:00**, and a service of **Nine Lessons and Carols on Saturday, December 21st at 3:00**. More info about those will follow in due time.

If you are interested in being a part of the choir, now would be an excellent time to join! The normal weekly commitment is Wednesday evenings from 7:00-8:30, and Sunday mornings beginning at 9:15am. We would love to have you as part of the choir! If you are interested, please see me, or write to me at music@christchurchpittsford.com.

I am immensely grateful to be a part of this wonderful parish, and I look forward to the start of a very successful program year together!

Chalice Bearers

Chalice Bearers assist the clergy at the communion rail by distributing the consecrated wine to the congregation.

Counters

The counters tally the plate offering money for both services after the 10:00 am service .

Lectors

The lectors support our worship by reading the Lessons and leading the Prayers of the People at the 8:00 am and 10:00 am services.

Greeters

The Greeters offer a warm welcome to all who enter Christ Church with particular emphasis on making newcomers feel welcome and comfortable. They also help folks find their way around church.

Ushers

The Ushers make sure the service runs smoothly from start to finish. Their service includes everything from handing out the bulletins, helping folks with the elevator, the offertory, and anything else needed. Jeremy Brown schedules the ushers and would love to have more people to help out.

Sunday School and Children's Chapel Volunteers

Our Sunday School program depends on volunteers for teachers, assistants, and helping with the workshops. We also need helpers for children's chapel at the 10:00 am service on the 2nd Sunday of the month. Scheduling is flexible and no experience is needed.

Altar Guild

The Guild sets up the altar for services, maintains the candles and linens, polishes the brass and silver, and makes sure that everything is at its best and brightest every week. The Altar Guild also sets up for weddings, funerals and evensongs. At the conclusion of Sunday services, they help to break down the flowers from the altar into smaller bouquets that are delivered to parishioners.

Flower Delivery

Members of the Flower Delivery Team deliver altar flowers every Sunday after the 10:00 a.m. service. Two to four individuals or couples make the deliveries of six or more flower arrangements that have been prepared by Altar Guild volunteers. Parishioners receiving flowers include people who are homebound, the bereaved, and those who are celebrating birthdays, births or baptisms.
